Academic departments of pathology are facing significant pressures which adversely impact their ability to carry out their missions of teaching, clinical service, and research. This meeting focuses on graduate pathology education and development of educational programs and curricula for training of pathologists. This meeting is targeted toward professionals (MD, PhD, or MBA) and others who serve as the academic, medical, scientific and administrative leaders of departments of pathology in the United States and Canada.

Speaker and Author Disclosures
